

Priority Area Progress: Education

Objective #1: By 2023, increase support for public education through public will-building

- \$150 million public education bond (2018)

Objective #3: By 2021, create community- based centers for early childhood development with a particular focus on areas of concentrated poverty

- Upgraded Pre-K classrooms at Burlington Housing Authority to meet State licensure requirements





Priority Area Progress: Access to Care

- Objective 1: By 2023, evaluate the utilization rates of specific healthcare services (other than the emergency department) and make recommendations for changes to policies to increase access with a particular focus on Medicaid eligible and single men and women
 - Analyze utilization rate of uninsured patients
- Objective 2: By 2023, evaluate utilization of Emergency Department for non-acute health needs, identifying and revising policies and procedures that create barriers to access.





Priority Areas Progress: Access to Care

Objective 3: By 2023, increase the percentage of persons who receive services with a particular focus on reducing racial disparities for diabetes, breast cancer, and maternal/infant health.

- Open Door Clinic
 - Primary care
 - BCCP program
 - Reports outcomes for diabetic patients to NC Association of Free and Charitable Clinics by ethnicity and racial group
- Healthy Alamance
 - Health outcomes tracking
 - Transportation shuttle for farmers' market and screening services in North Park
 - Community Health Worker pilot
 - Translation & interpretation services








Priority Area Progress: Economy

- Objective 1: Decrease the percentage of people spending more than 40% of their income on rental housing and transportation. Expand affordable housing opportunities in higher opportunity areas.
- Objective 2: Utilize census/ zip code data to inform the development of intervention specifically targeting poverty and its effects on health disparities.
 - Opportunity zone
 - Inform food distribution & vaccinations
 - Health outcomes tracking
 - Community advisory board



Emerging Issues: Social Unrest in Alamance County





Priority: Education



Garrett Elementary in Mebane- \$20,000 grant recipient

- Outdoor learning and performance environment
- Inclusive for the variety of learning styles present at the school
 - A+ Arts focus
 - Diverse socio-economic population
 - Special education students- occupational and physical therapy
- Design caters to Pre-K through 5th grade
- Accessibility and Sustainability
 - Sensory sidewalks, pavilions, raised garden beds, benches, visual and music arts opportunities, book boxes, and a natural exploration area



New Initiatives: Community Loan Program

Priority: Economy

- Minority and women-owned small businesses were disproportionately affected by the Covid-19 crisis
- Impact Alamance invested \$50,000 in the loan program to increase the number of loans available to small businesses in Alamance County
- Provide non-traditional funding as well as technical assistance to primarily underserved communities in Alamance to help them recover and grow their businesses

COMMUNITY RECOVERY LOANS



Small businesses and nonprofit organizations that were in business before COVID-19.

Recovery from the economic costs of COVID-19, including working capital, business rent or mortgage, employee or independent contractor pay, business redesign equipment, restocking of inventory, PPE purchases and other costs of re-opening for business in compliance with COVID-19 requirements.

New Initiatives: DC Community Kitchen

Priority: Economy

- Partnership of Healthy Alamance, The Dream Center, and passionate community members
- Received \$20,000 grant
- Will serve as a training center for high school students and residents interested in developing culinary and business skills
- Provide free weekly meals to the East Burlington community
- The kitchen will be sustained by local entrepreneurs who rent the facility.

New Initiatives: MAC's Diner (Meals for Alamance County Children)

Priority: Access to Health/Healthcare

- Partnership between ABSS and local churches
- Funds raised by faith community, business community, Impact Alamance, and individuals in Alamance County
- Summer of 2019, 1900
 children received lunch and 650 breakfast at these sites
- MAC's Diner provided meals to children in areas of high concentration of need during the summer months and other times when the schools are closed



New Initiatives: Enhancing School Playgrounds

Priority: Access to Health/Healthcare



- Funding for 2020 focused on E.M. Yoder, Pleasant Grove, and Smith Elementary schools.
- To date, 14 elementary schools have received updated playgrounds.
- Community Use of Outside Facilities Policy adopted by the Alamance-Burlington School System in Feb 2016.
- Impact Alamance will continue to invest \$150,000 each year until all of the elementary schools within the county are upgraded.
